Whole school attendance for this week was 93.2%


Whole School Attendance from September is: 94.6%

We are delighted to share that our library has received a generous donation—a brand new Toniebox along with a selection of Tonie figures! A Toniebox is a popular audio player designed specifically for children. It's a digital listening device that utilises figurines called Tonies to play audio content. Each Tonie represents a specific character or story, containing pre-recorded audio material such as children's songs, stories, or educational content.

To experience the magic, a child simply places a Tonie on top of the Toniebox, and the device will play the corresponding audio content. The Toniebox is designed to be intuitive and child-friendly, enabling our young readers to enjoy audio stories and music independently. We have kindly been donated eight figurines, providing a variety of content for our library visitors and look forward to hopefully growing our collection.




This week we have enjoyed the story, Leaf Man by Lois Ehlert. From this we developed our understanding of the four seasons, focusing on Autumn. We collected different leaves and used them to create some lovely artwork. Some children chose to use leaves to print, others used wax crayons to make leaf rubbings, exclaiming it was just like magic seeing the leaf prints emerging. As well as using leaves, we also used conkers to mix Autumn colours, rolling them in a tray. To illustrate the changing seasons, we used cotton buds to create pointilism trees, dotting the different colours from each season onto tree outlines.


In maths this week, we have continued to explore numbers 1,2 and 3. We used the Gingerbread Man and the Enormous Turnip stories to introduce one more and one less, using the characters to illustrate the amounts. We also introduced 5-frames and double sided counters to understand the composition of numbers to 3.






















1 - We are so impressed with how the children have returned to school after the half term break full of enthusiasm and ready to learn. In geography this week we have been learning about continents and made a map jigsaw.




2 - We understand the importance of exploring time to the children in year 1. The transition from reception to year 1 can be a big jump and we have decided to continue exploring time for children into term 2. This is where children learn through play. They select from a range of carefully planned play opportunities to extend their learning.



3 - This term our role play area is a vets as this links with our science topic of 'animals including humans'.



We are so impressed with how well Year 2 have returned after the half term. The children are already showing such enthusiasm for our new History topic of 'The Great Fire of London' and they can't wait to become historians and continue discovering more!



4 - Our new text for English is 'Vlad and the Great Fire of London'. The children have made predictions for what they think the plot will be, based on the front cover and blurb. We have also worked in groups to sequence the key events of the story.

Reading Book Reminder

The children are able to change their reading book once they have finished it (now not on specific days). They will do this independently, however an adult will be checking and keeping track of how many books have been read - don't forget we're working towards our '30 reads' prize at the end of this half term!

Year 3



Design brief:

A new Christmas shop is opening in the shopping centre. They are trying to source stock to sell in their shop. The company have asked us to create them a range of Christmas cards that they could sell. The cards have to celebrate Christmas, have at least one moving element and can have any design on the front.

Year 3 have received a design brief and are now starting the journey of fulfilling this brief.

They will be considering their target audience as well researching examples of other cards with moving elements.

Along the way they will be thinking about the different types of mechanisms that will allow the card to have a moving element and learn how to make these mechanisms to use in their design.

All of this in time for Christmas. It will be a busy term in year 3!



YEAR 3

It has been wonderful to see our Year 4s dive into their new 'rivers' topic with so much enthusiasm this week.

During English, both classes have been inspired by Grahame Baker-Smith's "Rhythm of the Rain" to write exciting, expanded noun phrases.

During Geography, the children have been uncovering the fascinating features of rivers including sources, springs, valleys, meanders, waterfalls, estuaries and floodplains.


In PE, we have been practicing our footwork by using different techniques to move across the floor. We will use these skills later this term to play football.
















YEAR 5

Year 5 have started the new term in English by beginning their study of the novel Cosmic by Frank Cottrell-Boyce. They will be using this story to write a persuasive advert and a persuasive email. This week they have considered different persuasive devices including emotive language, repetition, rhetorical questions and alliteration.

This term children will be learning about forces as part of their scientific learning. This week they have begun by learning about Sir Isaac Newton.

We concluded last term by visiting The Science Centre at Hertsmonceux in East Sussex to enhance our learning of Space as part of our science learning. We also had an art day where we used printing techniques to create pictures inspired by Peter Caulfield and Vicky Oldfield.



















This week Year 6 began their new art topic - portraiture. We began the lesson thinking about what portraiture is and looking at some examples, identifying some similarities and differences between the pieces. We then looked at how light and dark can be created in a drawing and the children spent some time using pencil and oil pastels or charcoal to recreate an existing portrait.

"We have been looking at portraiture, a portrait is a representation of a person. We have used charcoal, pastels and pencil to recreate portraits." - Shayan
