Whole school attendance for this week was 93.3%


Whole School Attendance from September is: 94.3%

## **EYFS**



In maths this week, EYFS have been using positional language to create obstacle courses during childinitiated learning. We used various equipment to enable us to travel over, under and through. We found that some of our obstacles were either too high or low so we had to adapt some.

'I'm going to make it smaller because I want to jump over it....Its easy now!'


'I can't go under it because it's near to the floor'










1 - We are always using our exploring time to reinforce concepts taught in our formal lessons. Here you can see we have some resources out for the children to explore the number bonds to 10.


They have continued their learning on a balanced diet in science and considered the effects of not getting the right nutrients.

# YEAR 3







We have had a very busy week in Year 4! In science, we continued our investigations into the properties of materials by learning about heating and cooling. The children observed how different materials such as egg white, butter and candle wax reacted to heating and cooling- look what happened when they warmed chocolate in their hands!

In English, they wrote some amazing poems based on the journey of a drop of water in the book The Rhythm of the Rain. Both classes used expanded noun phrases to beautifully describe everything the drop of water encountered on its adventure.

We also continued to learn about rivers by focusing on the River Thames in geography- using maps we traced the Thames from source to mouth and named physical and natural features along its route.



YEAR 5

In Year 5 this week children have continued their learning in geography and learnt how relief is shown on a map. They have discussed contour lines, spot height and shading on maps.

Within English, they have continued their study of the book Cosmic. They have edited and improved their persuasive adverts and also learnt about modal verbs and adverbs of possibility as part of their SPAG learning.

In science, children have investigated air resistance and through scientific enquiry, they tested different sized parachutes to identify how to increase and decrease the rate of fall.

In maths, children have been investigating square and cube numbers using manipulatives.
