Dear Parents and Carers,

This has been a great first week back to the final term of the year; there is much to learn and of course much to celebrate as we head towards the end of an academic year! Transition Plans For September 2022


Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month





YEAR 1

This week in EYFS we have enjoyed reading the story of 'Snowy' by Berlie Doherty. In the story we met Rachel who lives on a narrow boat and Snowy the working horse who pulls the narrow boat. The children wrote some lovely character descriptions of Snowy, describing her 'feathery feet' and the bells and ribbons she wore. During child initiated, some children drew and labelled Snowy as well as building models of Snowy pulling the narrow boat along. The children were fascinated by the film we watched of other working horses from the past. We saw horses transporting police and firefighters as well as delivering milk and collecting coal down the mines. We then linked to the parades many of the children had enjoyed watching over the Jubilee weekend and the horses taking part.

This week we welcomed children from local nurseries who will be joining us in September for a 'stay and play' session with our current children. We were proud of how our children played with and supported the new children. It was also lovely for them to see some of their pre-school staff and for the staff to see how our children have grown and developed since starting school.









Year 1 started their exciting new topic in science - What are plants? Before half term we planted a bean seed. The seeds were looked after by our teachers over half term and we are amazed to see how much they grown!













This week year two have been introduced to plants in their Science learning. To find out the ideal conditions for plant growth we set up and experiment with four conditions: water and sunlight, water and no sunlight, no water and sunlight and no sunlight or water. We even placed the seeds in the dark cupboard. Over the next few weeks we will be monitoring the growth of the seeds,

Our second experiment of the week will answer the Year 2 enquiry question 'Do plants grow the same amount each day?'. After making predictions the children have begun to measure and record daily growth. One bean had grown 0.5cm in one day! We have also noticed signs of germination on the other beans.















YEAR 3

This week Year 3 enjoyed a fun afternoon beginning to play tennis with Miss Bennett. The children learnt how to hold the racket correctly, the passed the ball to each other over the net and focussed on hitting the ball accurately. We were really impressed with how well the children played!










YEAR 4




























YEAR 5

This week, Year 5 went on a school trip to Maidstone Museum to learn about the Industrial Revolution. The first thing we did was a workshop about three main industries in Maidstone in the 1800s: paper, hops and sweets. We learnt about things like hopdogs, beer barrel tops, toffee tins and advertisements.

Then we had the chance to explore the museum. We saw hop pressing machines, paper making machines, and learnt about Maidstone's first workhouse in 1719. Other sections we visited include archaeology, natural history, prehistory (there were some excellent dinosaur models!), Japan and Ancient Egypt (where we saw an actual mummy, which was amazing).

It was a brilliant day and the children were impeccably behaved. We would all like to go back again!





































On Thursday our Year 6s ventured to Maidstone to take part in **Safety in Action.** Safety in Action is an interactive event designed to support children in understanding some of the dangers they may face as they become more independent and prepare for transition to secondary school.

The event was supported by many organisations including Salus, Kent Police, Kent Fire and Rescue Service, RNLI, Kent County Council and UK Power Networks.

Throughout the afternoon the children were involved in a number of scenarios designed to simulate and provide information about a variety of topics including:

- Fire Safety
- Water Safety
- Electrical Safety
- Rail Safety
- Road Safety
- Online Safety
- Personal Safety
- Emergency Life Support


