# YEAR 1

This week EYFS enjoyed a fantastic London themed dance workshop. As part of the dance the children learnt different movements including heel drops, salutes, marching and skipping.

We certainly have some budding athletes in EYFS with some impressive throwing. The hot weather gave us a good opportunity to revisit some of our work from keeping healthy week on the importance of sun safety. 








# YEAR 5




